November was a month where our Mountaineers heard powerful stories, met inspiring leaders and rolled up their sleeves to give back. From mental health advocacy to anti-bullying education, leadership development, and hands-on community service, our student-athletes had countless opportunities to grow as teammates, leaders and people.


Mental health advocate <u>Justin Brien</u> shared his personal journey about mental illness, substance misuse and suicidality with honesty and vulnerability. Speaking to our Grade 9–12 student-athletes, Justin reminded us of the importance of finding our "why," checking in on each other, and recognizing that strength often begins with asking for help.

Our junior high student-athletes welcomed the <u>Anti-Bullying Society</u>, an organization committed to actively preventing bullying before it has serious long-term effects. The session left our students with a powerful takeaway: kindness is leadership, courage is strength, and every voice can make a difference in creating safer, more inclusive spaces.

Leadership development continued when Rob Kerr met with our U17 Prep and U18 Prep teams to introduce the 10-20-30 Project – a framework built around competing with character, leading with respect, and building stronger teams on and off the ice. Rob also introduced the U17 Prep and U18 Prep teams to a community engagement partnership with Brown Bagging for Calgary's Kids, encouraging athletes to look beyond performance and consider their impact on the world around them.

That spirit of service was experienced by the U18 Prep program first, who spent an evening volunteering in the Brown Bagging kitchen last week. Together, our Mountaineers supported nearly 2,000 lunches for Calgary students – a likely record-breaking effort for an evening production, according to the BB4CK team. In just two hours, the U18s rolled more than 1,000 energy balls, made over 240 sandwiches, and prepared school snack bins for 20 Calgary schools. The Brown Bagging staff shared that the group was hardworking, adaptable and a joy to host.

From learning, listening and reflecting, to stepping up and serving, November gave our Mountaineers countless reminders of what character looks like in action.

Killoran Represents Canada at World Championships



At just 16, she's chasing her dream of one day performing acro with Cirque du Soleil – and this was a huge step on that journey. Way to go, Cearaphena!














Seven and Counting: Post-Secondary Commitments Start Rolling In

We are thrilled to see them take the next step in their journeys as they prepare to compete at the collegiate level next year:

Hockey

- Samantha Baker University of Alberta (U SPORTS)
 - Across three seasons with Edge, Sam has registered 54 points in 78 CSSHL games and brings a strong two-way presence to the lineup. She also represented Team Alberta at the 2025 National Aboriginal Hockey Championships.
- Lila Deis University of Minnesota, Mankato (NCAA Division I)
 A dynamic forward, Lila has recorded 29 points in 45 CSSHL games. She represented Team Alberta at both the 2024 and 2025 U18 Women's National Championships.
- Alexis Ehrman St. Cloud State University (NCAA Division I)
 - A steady force in net, Alexis has backstopped Edge to a 21-17-2 CSSHL regular season record with a 2.67 GAA and .919 save percentage. A 2024/25 CSSHL Top Goaltender finalist, she also represented Team Alberta at the 2025 U18 Women's National Championship.
- Avaya McCann Trinity Western University (U SPORTS)
 - A three-year member of the U18 Prep program, Avaya has tallied 38 points in 73 CSSHL games. Known for her versatility and athleticism, she also competes in high-level box lacrosse and has represented Team Alberta.
- Cassia Severin University of Alberta (U SPORTS)
 - Cassia has been a reliable contributor over her three seasons with the program, collecting 31 points in 58 CSSHL games and consistently anchoring play at both ends of the ice.



Olivia Johnson has once again proven herself among the nation's best, capturing her second consecutive Maple Leaf Junior Tour (MJT) Girls 15–19 National Championship.

The event brought together 112 of Canada's top young golfers at the 2025 MJT National Championship, held November 7–9 on the Legends Course at Orange Lake Golf Resort in Florida.

Olivia shot rounds of 72, 74, and 72 (218) – including eight birdies – to secure the national title for the second straight year.

Reflecting on her back-to-back victory, she shared, "I think just taking it one shot at a time and staying calm."





Across five tournament games, Brock England led all Edge alumni with seven points (2G, 5A), while Mirco Dufour added five points (4G, 1A). Between the pipes, Leif Oaten played in four games, posting a 2.95 GAA and 0.905 SV%, earning recognition as the only goaltender named to the tournament All-Star team.


