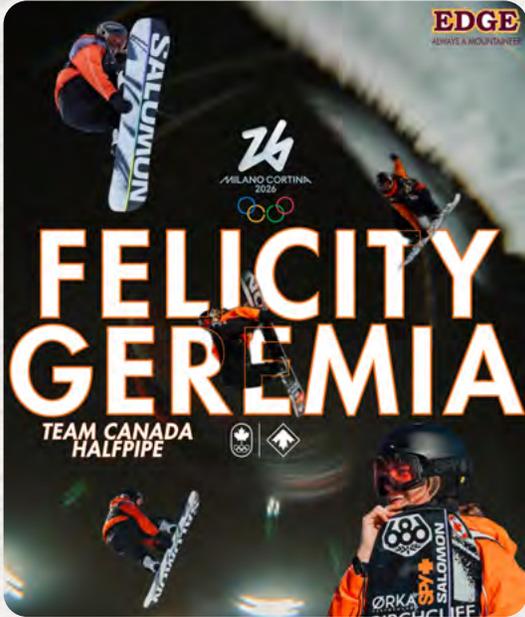


## Olympic Dream Realized for Geremia



Class of 2025 graduate Felicity Geremia has been named to Team Canada’s Olympic Halfpipe team for the Milano Cortina 2026 Winter Olympic Games – a milestone moment in an extraordinary athletic journey that began long before the world stage came into view.

After earning her spot on the Canadian National Halfpipe Team following the 2023–24 season, Felicity continued to build momentum throughout 2024–25. Her season included two podium finishes on the Revolution Tour, a second-place overall finish in the NorAm Cup standings, five World Cup appearances across three continents, and a major career milestone – competing in her first World Championships in St. Moritz, Switzerland.

A Mountaineer for eight years, Felicity’s path to the Olympics is made even more impressive by her versatility. A standout multi-sport athlete, she competed at a high level in softball and soccer. Ultimately, Felicity made the bold decision to pursue snowboarding full-time – a commitment that demanded focus, resilience and an unwavering belief in her Olympic dream.

Last year, Felicity was named the recipient of the Edge Athletic Achievement Award, presented annually to a graduating student who has demonstrated extraordinary athletic accomplishments during their time at Edge. It was a fitting honour for a student-athlete like Felicity who had an unmatched commitment to improvement in not only all of the sports she played, but in her academics as well.

Now, that long climb has led to the biggest stage in sport. Felicity will represent Canada – and Edge – at the 2026 Olympic Games. Congratulations, Lis. We couldn’t be prouder and can’t wait to cheer you on!

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## Wellness Week Focused on Leadership, Empathy and Choice

Last week, we hosted a powerful Wellness Week experience for students in Grades 4–9, welcoming leadership facilitator and speaker Bryan Saint-Louis to campus.

Over the course of the week, Bryan delivered 8.5 hours of leadership training to students, drawing from four of his developed courses: Radical Empathy, The Power of Choices, Growth Mindset and Sportsmanship. Each session was intentionally designed to meet students where they are, while challenging them to think more deeply about how their actions, mindset and character shape both their own experiences and the culture around them.



In just one week, Bryan quickly became a school favourite, building authentic connections with students and creating spaces where honest conversation, reflection and growth could happen. His impact has been immediate, with teachers already noting how lessons from Wellness Week are showing up in classrooms through stronger self-awareness, improved decision-making and more empathetic interactions among our students.

Bryan later reflected on his time at Edge, sharing his gratitude for the opportunity to work with students and highlighting the school's commitment to character education.

This role ensures our athletes don't just return to sport – they return stronger, more confident, and better prepared to perform.



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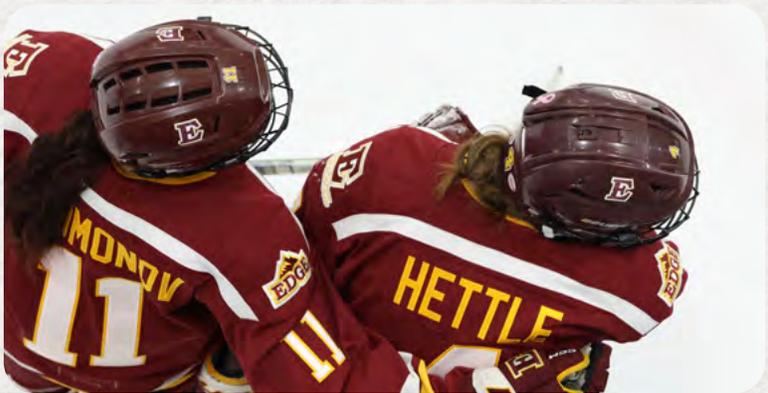
